October saw the return of Black History Month. Again, this has formed the basis of assemblies and PSHE lessons that look at the largely unpublicised role that black people have played in the history of the country and the world.

Here in Fishponds, at the start of the month students engaged in an assembly for Black History Month.

This year's theme was 'Saluting our sisters' and it was only appropriate for them to learn about Henrietta Lacks and her unknown contribution to history. Henrietta Lacks was an African-American woman whose cancer cells are the source of the HeLa cell line, the first immortalised human cell line and one of the most important cell lines in medical research. Her cells are still being used












Brentry Bulletin
